He was born on 15 October 1880 in Mondavio, Italy into a humble family. He was ordained priest on December 8, 1903, for the Diocese of Civita Castellana. He was elected Bishop of Viterbo on February 22, 1916. He held this position until he was named Bishop of Pozzuoli on May 17, 1936. He was named Bishop of Rome on February 10, 1957 and was Camerlengo of the Holy Roman Church from January 1, 1958 to 1963. On November 26, 1963 he was elected Archbishop of Capua. He held this position until his death on August 18, 1964.
